Residents' Groups

What is a residents' group?

Residents' groups are set up to provide support and assistance to their neighbourhood. They have a common purpose and set out to achieve a common goal. They may be set up to provide recreation activities, eg playgroups, or in response to a perceived threat to the stability or character of a neighbourhood, eg saving an historic building.

Maps detailing the areas covered by existing residents' groups, together with contact names, are shown on pages 30-36.

Residents' groups formation and recognition

- 1. The Christchurch City Council encourages the formation of local residents' groups.
- 2. Local residents' groups are able to apply to the Community Board for recognition as an 'official' residents' group for the area.
- 3. Residents' group boundaries within each community are determined by the relevant Community Board.
- 4. Such groups, upon recognition, receive the right to be consulted by the Council on all work planned within their boundaries.
- 5. The Council provides free typing and photocopying for official residents' groups, within limits approved by the Community Advocate.
