A report from Stuart Woods, Christchurch City Council officer, updated the Committee on recent progress on the central city bus interchange and termini study.

The report was further illustrated with a series of overhead transparencies covering:

Three handouts were tabled:

The Committee **decided** to receive the report.

It was noted that the key decision to date was that the Christchurch City Council and Canterbury Regional Council had decided that the City should not have a single, major central terminal, but instead have a central interchange with a number of what are called "peripheral termini" – a series of layover points – in the outer parts of the central area.
