


7. DEPUTATIONS BY APPOINTMENT

7.1 Philip Ball – Sumner Pool Committee



Philip Ball (President, Sumner Pool Committee) attended to speak to the Board about the costs of running the pool in view of the new legislation concerning pool water quality. He stated that water needed to be tested four times a day at a cost of \$50 a test. Mr Ball also noted that the number of key sales were down on previous years, extra maintenance was also required and the pool would need re-painting.

The Board asked Mr Ball to provide a copy of the Sumner Pool Committee's statement of accounts.

7.2 Woolston Pool

Roger Dowling attended to argue for the retention of the suburban pools and their upgrading and heating. He considered that the pools were good for young children in Christchurch, and assisted in providing a sense of community. The suburban pools fulfilled a useful need in local communities. Children and families could bike or walk to them. He presented 230 signatures from children living in the Woolston area requesting that the Woolston pool remain open.

7.3 Lane Name – Moncks Spur Road

Mr & Mrs Bryce attended regarding a proposed new right-of-way name on Moncks Spur. They were establishing a subdivision developed on a sustainable living environment and ecological basis, to conserve soil and water resources. Mr and Mrs Bryce expressed their preference for the new right-of-way name.

The Board's decision is recorded under Part C, Clause 18 of this report.

7.4 Youth Initiatives Trust

Claire Milne, from the Youth Initiatives Trust attended to update the Board on the progress of the youth café. The building refurbishment is progressing and it is hoped that it will open in the near future. Claire Milne commented that this project was a very good example of a community development process. The interviewing for a café manager was progressing. The Board commended the Trust for the way it had worked and developed this project.

7.5 Hay Street/Ruru Road Intersection

John Billingsley, a representative of concerned parents living in the Hay Street/Ruru Road area, attended to express concern at the traffic problems at the Hay Street/Ruru Road intersection. Heavy vehicles use it to go through to Maces Road and there have also been problems with younger inexperienced drivers using it. There has been a number of accidents over the last five years and the residents are concerned for their and their children's safety.

Mr Billingsley will approach the Bromley Residents Group. The Board advised Mr Billingsley that the intersection has been identified in the Bromley Local Traffic Management Scheme as requiring work. The Board **decided** that the Community Advocate discuss this matter with officers from the City Streets Unit and that the Council's speed trailer unit be placed in this location.
