Re SUBMISSIONS – “OUR COMMUNITY PLAN
2006 to 2016

1. As I have stated in my previous submissions to the Annual Plan, there is an urgent need for footpaths on Cranford Street. I keep being told by Council that Cranford Street is going to be upgraded but how many people have to be killed before the Council acts and puts footpaths in the only road within two miles from the centre of the city?. It is terrible that the City Council reneges on it's obligations to the community in this way, but if it was your loved one killed on a mobility scooter-maybe the stance would be different.
2. The need to fast track roading infrastructure:- perhaps the Council has not allowed enough money in their budget to fulfil all the work that needs to be done for the city and its traffic problems!. I think they look at so many different options, by the time they have looked at them all, they don't get anything completed. All the procrastinating escalates the cost of doing the work, and then Council informs us that there is no money to do the work and it is put off for many more years. While the problems continue to escalate, other infrastructure problems accumulate and rise along the way, the net result is that nothing gets done. With the roading crisis getting worse, the northern arterial land through St Albans was all

purchased twentyfive to thirty years ago. What have we achieved in that time? Maybe if the council of the day was pro-active and was forward thinking and took advice from your traffic engineers and committed to doing the job – it would have been completed. But what we have is the Council looking at the cost and the money it will take to do the job, and putting it off and in the too hard basket and each year the traffic congestion gets worse.

3. Placemakers entrance continues to be a problem for me getting machinery across the road and motorists having no consideration for me farming in the centre of the city. Christchurch City Council will not give access to Cranford Street for ten acre blocks or residential development citing Cranford Street as a limited access road on the rural part of it. I will remind you I am the owner of this land and I'm sick of being treated and used as a caretaker for the City Council and their issues with roading and drainage for the city.

It is imperative that the Council make a decision under the Resource Management Act for the future development of the rural land beside Cranford Street.
