The purpose of this report is to provide information and seek comment on the removal of eight Liquidambar trees on Mirfield Place and the replacement of these trees with a more suitable species.

The matter will then be referred to the City Services Committee for a decision.

INTRODUCTION

The Liquidambar trees were planted in 1969 on the berm and are causing significant damage to the pavements and kerb and channel. This particular species of tree has the potential to out grow the area it is planted in with mature trees having a girth in excess of 1 metre in diameter. In streets such as Mirfield Place where the distance between the property boundary and the kerb is relatively narrow, they are no longer considered to be a suitable street tree. The current practice for this species is that they are now only planted in larger grass berms, road reserves or multi-laned median divided arterial roads where there are fewer restrictions to their height and root growth

If these trees are to remain in Mirfield Place, then the "life" of any repairs will be relatively short given that the current trees are approximately a third of their potential size. To regularly revisit a site carrying out remedial work is not a cost-effective use of resources

TREE RETENTION

Parks Unit and City Streets staff have recently reassessed the situation to investigate any opportunities to retain the existing trees. Mirfield Place is currently 9 metres wide (kerb to kerb). The minimum width for streets as stated in the City Plan is 7.5 metres (kerb to kerb). Narrowing Mirfield Place to a 7.5 metre carriageway would provide an additional 750mm clearance on either side of the street. Although this would alleviate the problem in the short term, there would still be insufficient area for the eventual size of these trees.

Realignment of the entire kerb and channel is not a cost effective option due to the overall cost for this type of work and the fact that the problem would reoccur within a relatively short time frame. Apart from the immediate areas being affected by the trees, the remainder of the kerb and channel is in a satisfactory condition and does not warrant replacing at this stage.

Building the kerb out around each tree was also considered. However this requires the installation of a sump on either side of the "build out" to maintain the correct grade and ensure water flow along the channel. Once again this is a very expensive solution and not seen as a cost-effective option given that it would only provide a temporary respite in the long term.

RESIDENTS VIEWS

Following a letter of complaint, which suggested that the majority of the residents would like the trees removed, a letter was circulated to all the residents seeking their views on the possible removal of the trees.

Of the thirteen households in Mirfield Place, ten preferred the option of removing the Liquidambars and three asked for the trees to be retained.

A copy of the initial letter and subsequent reply **follows**.

PROPOSED WORK

Given the response from Mirfield Place residents the Parks Unit would propose to remove all the existing Liquidambar trees in Mirfield Place prior to replacing them with a more suitable tree species next planting season. The proposal is to remove the existing liquidambers around April 2000 with the planting of the replacement trees programmed for June 2000 when the Parks Unit commences its annual Street Tree planting programme.

REPLACEMENT SPECIES

Some residents expressed reservations about New Zealand Kowhais as the replacement species. The existing berm width and location of underground services restricts the range of suitable tree species for Mirfield Place. However in acknowledging residents feedback, the Parks Unit proposes to come back to residents with some suitable alternatives if the proposed tree replacement goes ahead.

Recommendation: That the Board recommend to the City Services Committee that the

Liquidambar trees in Mirfield Place be removed and replaced with a

suitable species.

LIQUIDAMBAR STREET TREES – MIRFIELD PLACE

In June this year the Council received a letter from Mr David Hawke of 8 Mirfield Place on behalf of a number of residents in Mirfield Place.

Mirfield Place currently has a number of liquidambar street trees, which are causing significant damage to the pavements and kerb and channel.

This particular species of tree has the potential to out grow the area it is planted in with mature trees having a girth in excess of 1 metre in diameter. In streets such as Mirfield Place where the distance between the property boundary and the kerb is relatively narrow, they are no longer considered to be a suitable street tree. The current practice for this species is that they are now only planted in larger grass berms, road reserves or multi-laned median divided arterial roads where there are fewer restrictions to their height and root growth.

If these trees are to remain in Mirfield Place, then the "life" of any repairs will be relatively short given that the current trees are approximately a third of their potential size. To regularly revisit a site carrying out remedial work is not a cost effective use of our resources.

In response to the residents request the Parks Units proposed course of action is to remove all the liquidambars in Mirfield Place. The Liquidambars would be replaced with Sophora microphylla (New Zealand Kowhai), once the remedial work to the kerb and pavements has been completed.

However there is a formal process to go through when there is a proposal to remove all the trees in a particular street before the work takes place. The Parks Unit will now prepare a report outlining the problems with the trees in Mirfield Place and the proposed course of action.

The report will go to the Fendalton/Waimairi Community Board in the first instance for information and comment prior to going before the City Services Committee for recommendation and approval on the proposed course of action.

I am aware from Mr Hawke's letter that three out of the ten residents he contacted indicated they preferred their tree to remain. However some residents may wish to reconsider their view now that they have more information on the matter.

The Parks Unit would like to confirm the view of individual residents regarding these particular trees to ensure the report accurately reflects the most up to date view of Mirfield Place residents and to assist the Council in making a decision in regard to this matter.
