The purpose of this report is to update the Committee on the grants which have been made in the last six months from the metropolitan community development discretionary budgets.

BACKGROUND

The Community Relations Unit administers the following discretionary budgets:

The purpose of these funds is to support metropolitan community groups which work towards the outcomes of the Community Development and Social Wellbeing Policy, and the Children's and Youth Policies, as appropriate.

Applications are referred to this Committee for decision if they are for new initiatives or for more than \$20,000. All other applications are assessed against the policies and decided under delegated authority by the Community Relations Manager. A copy of the evaluation form used to assess applications is attached.
