6. HOLIDAY PROGRAMME REPORT

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Corporate Plan Output: Recreation Programmes and Promotion.

The purpose of this report is to inform the Community Board of school holiday programmes delivered by the Recreation and Arts Team, Christchurch City Council Leisure, in the Hagley/Ferrymead Community Board area over the April school holidays.

BENEFITS OF SCHOOL HOLIDAY PROGRAMMES

School holiday programmes provide quality, safe, recreation experiences for children and above all a chance to relax and enjoy themselves after the long school term. Longer term, school holiday programmes teach children good leisure habits and help them to learn about the activities and groups in their local communities. Holiday programmes are also an important community service to Christchurch families, particularly working families who require care for their children. This issue has been exacerbated by the introduction of the four term year, and by government moves to encourage single parents back into the workforce.

COMMENTS FROM PARTICIPANTS

There was an excellent response from the children with 13 completing to the evaluation form. Eleven rated the activities as "awesome", with the other two saying 'okay'. The most enjoyable activities were rock climbing and windsurfing, with QE11 rated as the third most popular. Future suggested activities included movies, ice-skating and mountain biking.

CONCLUSION

Overall the programme was most successful. Participants' behaviour was exceptional. Having the same staff for the last two holidays has helped in bringing continuity to the programme, and has also given the staff an opportunity to further develop their ideas. Due to the nature of this programme (adventure based) numbers have to be kept at a manageable level for health and safety reasons.

COMMENTS FROM PARENTS AND CHILDREN

Children's response was very positive, with comments such as, 'Can we play these games everyday'. Parents felt that the programme was great value, and that their children loved it. There was also frustration about how quickly the programmes fill up (the programme was full within one day of registrations opening).

CONCLUSION

Bottle Lake was a hit, with both the Supervisor and the children recommending this to be repeated in future programmes. The after school programme and holiday programme are managed by the same staff. This helps the staff in planning activities for the children and makes the settling in process by the children a lot faster.

COMMENTS BY PARENTS AND CHILDREN

The children enjoyed all activities with Science Alive being the favourite. Parents commented again about the lack of programmes to meet the demand. Parents felt very happy about all aspects of the programme and felt their children were well cared for by the staff.

CONCLUSION

The number of places on this programme was increased from 20 to 30 to cope with the high demand. In future the programme is combining with the newly established Linwood Avenue after school programme, which will assist in cutting costs and the sharing of resources.

The programme was organised at the last minute due to staff changes resulting in fewer numbers. This will improve with future programmes.

COMMENTS BY COMMUNITY RECREATION ADVISOR

Steps are being taken by the Recreation and Arts Team to look at the growing need for holiday programmes in this area and ways we can best meet demand. Over the last six months the Phillipstown Community Centre, Linwood Arts Centre and the Richmond After School Programme have developed to managing their own holiday programme with the financial support of the Hagley/Ferrymead Community Board and advisory assistance from the Community Recreation Advisor. Further initiatives in supporting community groups in establishing holiday programmes are being investigated. Supporting groups to establish and manage programmes is an effective means of spreading limited resources and is less costly than Christchurch City Council Leisure or another professional contracted provider delivering the programme. However the Team also recognises the need to provide holiday programmes in areas where a community is unable to sustain its own programme.
