

## 6. LEARNING THROUGH ACTION - ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION PROGRAMME FOR SCHOOLS

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The purpose of this report is to provide information about *Learning through Action*, the Council's Environmental Education Programme for schools, and to give an update on progress made from commencement of the programme on 21 August 2000 to date.

### EXTENT OF PROGRAMME

The audience for the education programme encompasses 184 primary and secondary schools in the greater Christchurch area, with programmes being delivered from a total of 14 Council sites including parks, waterways, heritage and waste sites.

### PROGRAMME BACKGROUND

- Funded by the Ministry of Education through a Learning Experiences Outside the Classroom (LEOTC) contract at \$100,000 per annum.
- Initial funding received for the period 1 July 2000 to 30 June 2003.
- Council to tender for ongoing funding in November 2002 for a further two years.
- Council support through the provision of Ranger and other Council staff for the delivery of education programmes.

### PROGRAMME OBJECTIVES

To provide primary and secondary school students from Years 1-13:

- Issues-based environmental education programmes linked to the curriculum.
- A very real context for learning experiences – our local environment.
- Hands-on activities to cater for different learning styles.
- Opportunity to show concern and take positive action for our city's environment.
- Added value to their on-site learning experience by offering teacher support through resource material for pre- and post-activities.

### AIMS OF PROGRAMME

- To reduce impact on the environment through education of young people, their teachers and the wider community about Council issues.
- To encourage sensitive use of and care for our city's natural and physical assets.
- To encourage participation by young people in decision-making processes and positive actions for the city's environment.

### BENEFITS OF PROGRAMME

- Reduction of impact on and positive action for the local environment.
- Promotion of a better environment through the education of young people, their teachers and the wider community.
- Development of decision-making processes in young people and their participation in the resolution of Council issues.
- Raising of community awareness of environmental issues and ways to take personal responsibility for actions.
- Promotion of an understanding of the role of the Council in the care of our built and natural environments.

### EXPECTED OUTCOMES

The Ministry of Education performance targets and measures require the:

- Provision of curriculum support programmes which give opportunities to students to participate in learning experiences outside the classroom.
- Promotion of the programme to all schools in the greater Christchurch area.
- Attendance by student count for programmes offered to be a total of 8,000 students from 75 schools per annum.

## **OUTCOMES TO DATE**

- Fourteen curriculum linked programmes developed for parks, waterways, heritage and waste sites and trials undertaken with schools.
- Ongoing promotion of all areas of the programme to schools in the greater Christchurch area through a full-page article on page 3 of *Our Environment*.
- Attendance for first full year of the programme in 2001 reached 9,286 students from 64 schools.

## **CONCLUSION**

The future plans for the programme include:

- The development of a greater variety and number of programmes offered to schools covering significant and current issues of importance to the Council.
- A greater awareness and participation by schools through increased promotion of the programme to schools in the greater Christchurch area through the production of a programme booklet and the provision of teacher workshops.
- The development of a web-based programme offering post-visit activity ideas and the facility to showcase follow-up actions taken by schools – to encourage greater participation in follow-up actions to improve the local environment.
