PURPOSE OF REPORT

The purpose of this report is to present information to the Fendalton/Waimairi Small Projects
Fund Assessment Committee in regards to the applications received for the Fendalton/Waimairi
Small Projects Fund for 2008/09 and to seek approval for the allocations under delegated
authority.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- 2. The Council adopted the Strengthening Communities Strategy on 12 July 2007. The Strategy incorporated the Community Group Grants Review which provided the framework, principles and funding outcomes for the new Strengthening Communities Grants Funding Programme. This programme replaces the Project and Discretionary Funding process as previously used by the community boards.
- 3. The Strengthening Communities Grants Funding Programme comprises four new funding schemes, which supersede all previous community group grant schemes, sub-schemes and categories. The new schemes are:
 - (a) Strengthening Communities Fund
 - (b) Small Projects Fund
 - (c) Discretionary Response Fund
 - (d) Community Organisations Loan Scheme
- 4. The new funding schemes enable Council and its community boards to support and provide leverage opportunities for not-for-profit, community focused groups seeking funding in support of their community endeavours. Detail of the outcomes, priorities and criteria of the new scheme are included in the background section of this report.
- 5. This report deals specifically with the Committee's allocations for the Small Projects Fund for Fendalton/Waimairi. The total available for the Fendalton/Waimairi Small Projects Funding Committee to allocate in 2008/09 is \$85,000.

The Decision Matrix

- 6. Detailed information on each applicant's project is presented in a decision matrix (attached). The matrix names the organisation applying for funding and clearly describes the individual project applied for, including up to four project goals that will be delivered via the project. Details of alignment with Council strategies and Board objectives is provided as well as historical background to projects and applicants where applicable. The matrix also includes staff recommendations for funding.
- 7. Under the Small Projects Funding Scheme, organisations were asked to make applications for 'project-based' costs, in order to show where ratepayers money was being spent and what outcomes were being achieved. As such, organisations may have made more than one application in order to fund separate projects and deliver a range of services.
- 8. The final matrix attached to this report includes 40 applications for funding with a total amount requested of \$123,226 and a total amount recommended by staff of \$85,000.

Timeline and Process

9. After the Committee has met and allocated the available funding (on 13 August 2008), all groups will be informed of the outcome of their application. All funding approved is for the period of 1 September to 31 August each year, therefore grants for this year will be paid out in early September 2008.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

10. Each Christchurch city urban community board has \$85,000 to allocate through the Small Projects Fund process and \$60,000 available in its Discretionary Response Fund, which is dealt with separately to this process and report.

BACKGROUND

- 16. The following funding outcomes have been used to evaluate and assess applications to the Small Projects Fund:
 - Support, develop and promote the capacity and sustainability of community recreation, sports, arts, heritage and environment groups;
 - Increase participation in and awareness of community, recreation, sports, arts, heritage and environment groups, programmes and local events;
 - Increase community engagement in local decision making:
 - Enhance community and neighbourhood safety;
 - Provide community based programmes which enhance basic life skills;
 - Reduce or overcome barriers to participation; and
 - Foster collaborative responses to areas of identified need.
- 17. The following priorities have been taken into consideration when assessing applications:
 - Older Adults;
 - Children and Youth:
 - People with Disabilities;
 - Ethnic and Culturally Diverse Groups;
 - Disadvantaged and/or Socially Excluded;
 - Capacity of Community Organisations; and
 - Civic Engagement.
- 18. Each community board's objectives were also taken into consideration when assessing applications.
- 19. Core criteria for applicants to the Small Projects fund are:
 - Not-for-profit, community-focused groups/organisations;
 - Legal status:
 - Based in Christchurch City Council (CCC) area and programmes primarily for CCC residents;
 - No unresolved previous accountability requirements and no overdue debts to CCC;
 - Must provide evidence of the project need;
 - Must have appropriate financial management, accounting, monitoring and reporting practices;
 - Applications must show evidence of authorised approval to seek funding from CCC; and
 - Must have sound governance, operational capacity and capability to deliver.
- 20. In making recommendations, and so as to ensure the consistency of recommendations with regard to all applications, staff held inter-unit collaboration meetings. At the meetings, individual applications were discussed and critically assessed. The meetings included staff members from Community Development, Community Engagement, Recreation and Sports, Greenspace and Democracy Services.

Staff comments including evidence of need:

Staff are recommending this application as a Priority 1 due to the true community development model used by the Trust and the best-practice shown by the Trust in regards to supporting and recognising the work of volunteers.

Family Fun Da

Twice a year the Trust hosts a community Family Fun Day. This provides an opportunity for the neighbourhood to gather together and have fun with the whole family. The day will include free children's entertainment, including a bouncy castle, games, face painting, lucky dips, sausage sizzle, and more. The volunteers from the Trust will help to run these events. This small community event is open to the whole community and welcomes the whole family - from children to grandparents.

WomenWise Programme

This project is to provide an ongoing support group for women in the community. This is a follow up to the Methodist Mission Child and Family Service's programme ChildWise and ParentWise. This group works towards enhancing and building on the strengths and skills the women already have. The topics that will be covered include: anger management; life coaching; grooming; creativity; assertiveness; recreational activities; enhancing and building self esteem.

Volunteer Recognition

The Bishopdale Community Trust recognises and encourages people within the community to volunteer their time towards community activities based at the Trust. This assists to create personal and community ownership of the Trust and the activities organised. Being a volunteer for the Trust helps to create a sense of self worth, belonging, and achievement. Many clients that come to the Trust are encouraged into volunteering as a means of developing independence, self reliance, and personal growth. It helps to create a caring and supportive community. The Trust encourages volunteers to upskill and offers support and opportunities for training. The Trust holds a 'thank you' event twice a year to recognise the voluntary input and work of the volunteers.

Approximately 145 people utilise the services and activities provided by the Trust each week.

Staff comments including evidence of need:

Staff are recommending this application as a Priority 1 due to the community development nature of the project, proven track record with Council, and the wide reach of the project. Between 80-100 people currently attend these programmes or use their services each week.

Over the last two years, particularly since the employment of a Community Worker, this Community Church has gone from strength to strength in regards to its provision of community support and services to the Burnside community. Their activities include:

- LINK (ESOL programme)
- Community Mornings (including walking group, Creative Capers preschool playgroup, craft groups card making, mosaics, and doll making)
- Sit and Be Fit (fitness programme for the elderly)
- KHAOS (a community youth group)
- 0800 Hungry
- The Burnside Barometer (Burnside community newsletter)
- Community Counselling

Staff fully support this application as the organisation has a proven track record of providing quality programmes and activities and work closely with Council to help identify areas of need and work towards addressing those needs.

Staff comments including evidence of need:

Staff recommend this project as a priority one due to fact that it has a large reach and is also addressing a key issue identified though research in this ward.

The 2006 Census showed that there are approximately 6,500 people of Asian ethnicity living in the Fendalton/Waimairi ward. The Chinese Church is a fantastic resource for us in this area as they provide a number of high quality support programmes and activities for Asians in this area.

This programme is to provide support for one of the most vulnerable groups in our city - elderly, non-English speaking Chinese. Between 50-70 people attend this programme each month and their ages range from 50 to 90 years old. The programme involves a lunch (which participants pay \$3 for), exercise, speakers on issues relevant to members i.e. health, community issues, recreation opportunity for social interaction. Some of the participants are brand new to New Zealand and some have been here for up to 50 years but still speak very little English.

The community English classes have been running for the past 18 years. There are three classes of approximately 10 people each class held on a Monday and Friday morning from 9.30am-11.30am.

Research undertaken in 2006 showed that isolation was a huge issue for this sector of our community. Language was a large barrier to a number of these people participating in community activities.

Staff comments including evidence of need:

Staff recommend this project as a Priority 1 due to its community development approach and the fact that this position is crucial to the continued delivery of a wide range of community programmes. The organisation also has a good track record with Council in providing a high quality service.

The Community Centre's objectives are to foster friendship, and build community amongst the social-economic and cultural diversity of the local area around it. The organisation also aims to support and strengthen families through their groups, programmes and other services.

The Community Centre runs pre-school music and playgroups, social and friendship groups for women and the elderly, craft groups, gentle exercise classes, computer tuition, after-school children's art classes, parenting programmes and family counselling.

The Community Liaison position is responsible for promoting the Centre by creating a twice yearly brochure which goes out to over 5,000 homes locally, as well as advertising in free community papers and establishing networks with schools and other Fendalton/Waimairi area organisations. They also communicate with funding bodies to ensure the continuation of low/no cost programmes as well as organising tutors for current classes and planning for future courses/groups.

Approximately 200 people benefit from these activities each week.

Staff comments including evidence of need:

The National Girls Brigade is in the process of introducing new style uniforms with the aim of all Brigades having the new uniforms for girls and leaders. Uniforms are provided free of charge to the volunteer leaders and the cost of members' uniforms is met through the annual subscription. However this is by donation and not all families are able to afford the subscription fees. Uniforms remain property of the Brigade and are passed on younger members.

This application is being split with Shirley/Papanui.

Staff comments including evidence of need:

Head Lice is a recurring problem in most schools and affects a large percentage of the families at Aorangi School, and the continual treatment costs are a huge burden to these families. Aorangi is a low decile school whose students come from a variety of socio-economic and ethnic backgrounds, but the greater percentage of the families are of low socio-economic and/or of Maori, Samoan, Asian or refugee ethnic origins.

Last term they instigated a treatment trial in the school and with parental permission and great volunteer support, they have spent at least two days a week since March checking and treating all children in the school as well as some preschoolers and parents.

Children have reported that they are sleeping better at night and have better self esteem. Teachers report that children are less irritable after treatment which reduces behavioural issues in the class and playground. The school has also noticed that rapport with many parents has also improved.

They desperately require funding to purchase enough treatment shampoo and the necessary equipment to enable them to keep up the momentum they have started to ensure that the children can focus in class and access the best education that they deserve.

Approximately 100 children and their families will benefit from this project.

The Bishopdale Combined Probus Club has been operating for 11 years and provides opportunities for retired and semi-retired people to keep their minds active, expand their interests, and enjoy the fellowship of new friends. They hold monthly meetings which include speakers from within the group and also guest speakers on a variety of topics. Over the past few years, the number of participants on the bus trips had declined due to the rising costs involved in such an outing. By receiving funding to subsidise this trip it reduces the financial barriers to participation for members. The funding requested contributes to the hire of the bus and the venue at their destination. Members pay for their own meals on the trip.

Approximately 52 people will go on the bus trip.

Research shows that the median age in Christchurch is expected to be 41.4 years in 2021. This will be noticed even more in 2011 when the baby boomers reach retirement age.

Staff comments including evidence of need:

The BCCSS has been operating for 19 years. They provide a much needed social service to disadvantaged people in Bryndwr and the surrounding areas. The Society, through its Community Worker, provides assistance to families through support with Family Group Conferences; food parcels in emergencies; and referrals to other support agencies as required. They also provide a community lunch on a regular basis and a weekly drop-in centre at Bryndwr Baptist Church.

The bus trips are provided for families and older members of the community, who would otherwise have no opportunity for such outings. Many have no means of transport and no family in Christchurch and also financial constraints. It allows them to socialise and mix with others, both in their own age group and from other age groups. Some residents from the Laura Fergusson Trust home for people with disabilities in Ilam Road also attend the outings.

As mentioned in the Bishopdale Probus application, the ageing population is going to create some major social issues and reducing social isolation is crucial to addressing some of these issues.

Staff comments including evidence of need:

The aim of Mainly Music is to provide an environment where children develop skills to enhance their preschool education through the use of music, rhythm, rhyme, dance and other music related activities with the participation of a parent or primary caregiver.

Bryndwr Mainly Music host a 30 minute music session each week during the primary school year. This is followed by morning tea, 'free-play' time or the children and adults. From time to time they also host 'Mother's Nights' to provide timeout, companionship and support for mothers with young children. They also run Family Days so that older siblings and partners can be part of the Mainly Music experience. They have a small library of parenting resources and DVDs for children. They have nine volunteers involved in running the programmes. Their roll cut off is 70 children and they currently have families on their waiting list.

The funding sought is towards the purchase of data projector. They have raised additional funds to have this projector mounted on the ceiling and in a protective cage. This equipment is required as they currently use an overhead projector which sits on a trolley and is quite hazardous for children. There is also the temptation for them to interfere with the transparencies during the session. Displaying the lyrics of the songs is an important part of early literacy for the children. The room which they use is a lovely modern, light room with full length windows on two sides. There are no curtains hence the need for a data projector that can operate in daylight conditions. This projector may also be available for other groups who use the room.

The 2006 Census showed that there are approximately 6,500 people of Asian ethnicity living in the Fendalton/Waimairi ward. The Chinese Church is a fantastic resource for us in this area as they provide a number of high quality support programmes and activities for Asians in this area.

The WAMBATS group is in its second year of operation and has approximately 20 parents turning up to each session. These sessions provide the parents with their children and to also mix with other parents and make new friends. Young Asian parents, particularly mothers, are often socially isolated and this is a great way to help break down this isolation. The sessions are bi-lingual which encourages participation from parents who do not speak English.

The 2006 Census showed that there are approximately 6,500 people of Asian ethnicity living in the Fendalton/Waimairi ward. The Chinese Church is a fantastic resource for us in this area as they provide a number of high quality support programmes and activities for Asians in this area.

These classes have been run successfully for the past 2 years. They currently have 10 classes which are run after school on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday. The duration of each class is two hours. They presently have 88 students and 10 volunteer teachers. Six of the classes teach simplified Mandarin, and two teach traditional Mandarin. The students are drawn from the wider community with only approximately 10% of them being members of the Church.

They have the opportunity to provide a training workshop for the teachers from a highly regarded trainer from Auckland.

The group acknowledges the classes provided by the Rewi Alley Chinese School but believe the high number of students they have clearly indicates a need for local classes. They also have a number of students who attend because they wish to learn traditional Mandarin which Rewi Alley School does not provide. They are however, keen to invite the Rewi Alley teachers to attend the training workshop if they wish.

The Papanui Youth Centre (Te Koru) is seeking funding to run four High School Boarder events at the Youth Centre.

There are a large number of high school boarding houses near the Youth Centre. Some of the Boarders find the weekends are times when they feel bored, particularly the younger ones. They often struggle to fit into their new environment, especially with having to work at disconnecting from their home situation and gaining new friends. This project will connect them into the community they live in by exposing them to the work and staff of Te Koru. This in turn will give them an opportunity to get involved with other events/programmes and to link with other young people in the area.

There will be four combined Boarding House events from September 2008 - August 2009. They will also provide an 'open day' with the climbing wall, café operating, art room, Playstation 3 room, computers, Sing Star, and using St Paul's Hall for active games.

Staff comments including evidence of need:

The Fendalton Probus Club has been operating for 26 years and provides opportunities for retired and semi-retired people to keep their minds active, expand their interests, and enjoy the fellowship of new friends. They hold monthly meetings which include speakers from within the group and also guest speakers on a variety of topics. They currently have 88 members.

The club wants to re-introduce outings, particularly day trips by bus of other transport. Enthusiasm for such events dropped off over the years to the point where trips no longer occur. There has recently been a request from members for these trips to be resumed, on a limited scale. A modest start is planned, only three trips annually, to build on the interest now apparent.

Probus Clubs are seen as something of a haven for retirees who might otherwise have lonely and unfulfilling lives. This particular club, the first to be founded in the South Island, wishes to improve the morale of its members and the re-introduction of trips can only help in that direction.

Research shows that the median age in Christchurch is expected to be 41.4 years in 2021. This will be noticed even more in 2011 when the baby boomers reach retirement age.

The ageing population will result in the need to consider the following:

Staff comments including evidence of need:

This programme focuses on developing and improving social skills, problem solving skills, and communication. It also teaches students to consider the consequences of the choices they make.

Year 6 students were chosen for this programme as they are about to transition to intermediate school and will be faced with a more grown up environment where their social skills will be tested. This programme is available to all Year 6 students which removes the stigma that children may otherwise associate with participating in a special learning programme. The programme has been running for two years and there has been 100% positive feedback from teachers, parents, and the students. Teachers and parents have both noted an improvement in the attitudes of their children.

Through feedback received from parents and teachers, the need has been identified to involve the parents and families of the children into the programme so that the learning gained through the programme can be reinforced within the child's daily life. This is also a way to connect families to each other and the wider school community.

Aorangi Primary School has a large migrant population, particularly Afghani, and this programme will help families to settle into their new community and culture. Through the relationships developed, families who require additional support can be assisted to access other services.

The programme is run by the Family and Community Worker at St Stephen's Community Centre. Approximately 20 children and their families will benefit from this project.
