PURPOSE OF REPORT

1. The purpose of this report is to summarise the issues raised by submitters who commented on the Draft Libraries 2025 Facilities Plan, April 2008.

ENGAGEMENT AND SUBMISSIONS PROCESS

- 2. The Draft Plan was published for public consultation on 14 April until 31 May with a one week extension for online comment due to a technical problem. A series of eight 'drop in' sessions were run across the city and Banks Peninsula and a number of group meetings were organised to speak on specific aspects of the plan. Presentations were given to four Community Boards.
- 3. The public comment period for the plan attracted 148 submissions representing a variety of groups or organisations and individuals. Submitters commented widely on the Plan indicating interest in the major developments and commenting on the principles and criteria of the plan, as well as comments about the plan in general.

SUMMARY OF THE DRAFT PLAN

- 4. The Draft Libraries 2025 Facilities Plan is a framework to guide the future development of the Christchurch City Libraries network through to 2025. The Plan looks to grow the network by tailoring any future development, network configuration or extension of services to better meet changing community needs, address growth and create focal points for community learning and leisure activities.
- 5. Through the Plan, the Council recognises the importance of libraries in providing social hubs in the community and the need to ensure future development reflects the cultural diversity of the community and the advances in digital information and communication technology.
- 6. The four key principles of the Plan are to provide library facilities which are community focal points, reflecting and responding to local needs; accessibility across the network to a mix of library services and facilities, including non-building based provision; maximum efficiency and effectiveness of facilities; and the optimisation of partnership opportunities with other agencies and/or services. Proposed under the Draft Plan are:
 - o A new library at Aranui to meet high community need.
 - A new library at Belfast to cater for population growth.
 - A replacement library at Halswell, again to address population growth.
 - Explore development options for Central Library in time to inform the 2012-2022 Long Term Council Community Plan.
 - Retain the library service at Bishopdale but review its location in the retail precinct.
 - Optimise partnership and/or co-location opportunities with retail development at The Palms to relocate and upgrade the Shirley Library.
 - Retain Hornby Library but investigate future options in line with the Greater Christchurch Urban Development Strategy.
 - Evaluate the future role of Redwood Library following the opening of a new library at Belfast.
 - Align the operation of the Fendalton Library with other suburban libraries in the network and pursue options for seven-day opening and the inclusion of a café.
 - Review Council's contribution to the maintenance of all voluntary libraries, in conjunction with the development of the Community Facilities Implementation Plan.
 - Evaluate service provision at Little River, taking into account a possible alternative nonbuilding based means of delivery.

The Draft Plan the signals Council's intention to continue to use the Mobile Library Service to provide access to resources where facility provision is not sustainable, investigates non-building based service delivery and self-help delivering options, such as library kiosks.

Partnerships have been identified as key to the development of Christchurch's library network. These to include the possible co-location with Council service centres, leisure and community facilities, and partnerships with educational institutes, retail complexes, neighbouring territorial authorities or rest home complexes. Initial consideration is to be given to opportunities for future enhancement of services at Linwood, Hornby or Papanui.

9. The Draft Libraries 2025 Facilities Plan will be regularly reviewed to address city growth and changes in priorities. These reviews will coincide with the timing for funding within the Council's LTCCP and Annual Plan cycles.

QUESTIONS CONSIDERED BY SUBMITTERS

Does the Plan accurately reflect what you think a network of libraries for Christchurch should look like in the future?

Does this Plan provide for libraries that will be community focal points and reflect and respond to different communities' needs?

Does the Plan show good value and use of current buildings and new buildings for the future?

Are there any community needs for library facilities that have been missed in the plan?

Do you wish to comment on any of the proposed new libraries (Halswell, Belfast, Aranui, Bishopdale and Central)?

Do you wish to comment on other significant developments?

Are there any other comments you would like to make about the Libraries 2025 Plan?

ANALYSIS OF SUBMISSIONS

Submissions - Introduction

A wide range of submission topics addressing the questions on the submission form as well as other single submission areas of interest to some respondents were received. Many submissions strongly reinforced the principles of libraries as community hubs and comments about partnership, co-location, good planning and expediency for growing communities were expressed. Opinions varied on how these issues may be address but the principles expressed in the Plan were generally supported.

Many of the submitters wrote on more than one topic and common themes emerged on all topics. These comments have been grouped in the overview below. Comments of a general nature will be considered in the day to day operation and management of the libraries and will be shared with the relevant managers

Tables

The table below shows the number of submitters by area of activity relating to aspects of the plan and are recorded by the *main* topic of the submission. The submission questions were wide ranging and related to many parts of the plan. Submission numbers do not necessarily relate to individual comments as many submitters commented on more than one aspect of the plan. However, they do indicate areas of interest.

Libraries and city areas

Little River Library

All submitters emphasised the importance of the library building as a focal point for the Little River community – a mobile library would not fulfil this role of creating a community hub. Improvement of the services was supported by several submitters and the Akaroa/Wairewa Community Board indicated the importance of Council services to a rural community and that they were aware that a full service might not be always possible. With rising fuel costs, local services were seen as more important than ever before. This comment was made by three submitters. Having 10% of the local children being homeschooled, the current library was seen as a vital link to information to support learning.

Belfast Library

All submitters strongly supported the need and desire for a library in Belfast. Some cited the need for a community focal point as a driver for the development and five commented that the rapid growth in the area was a strong indicator that it was timely to be doing this now and were keen to see the development happen soon (within five years). Linking with other Council services and/or the Belfast Primary School was seen a good opportunity by four submitters. A range of services were suggested to be included in any development including a café, meeting rooms and Service Centre with two submitters citing the relationship currently held between the Council and Riccarton High School as desirable for Belfast.

Aranui Library

The majority of the submissions were supportive of the Aranui community getting some form of library service for a variety of reasons including the high need for literacy and learning services for the whole community, access to learning opportunities and technology and matters of equity for the people of Aranui. Support for an Aranui library service was from across the city. Three submitters questioned the need for a library/learning centre in Aranui with one suggesting the proximity of Linwood and New Brighton, the other suggesting New Brighton be moved closer and one indicating Redwood would be a better use of library for the community. Aranui High, Aranui Community Trust (ACTIS) and Aranui Community Learning Centre sent positive submissions all interested in working with the Council to achieve a positive outcome and also stressing the importance of collaboration and partnership with the community in the planning and execution of the service. Several submitters suggested locations for the service including the New World site in Pages Road; an accessible location for all the community and on a bus route was a priority.

Halswell Library

All submitters were supportive of the need for a library in Halswell to accommodate the growth in the area. Seven indicated the services they would like to see at the library: these include a service centre, café (2 for, 1 against), longer opening hours and community meeting places. Speed of securing a site was noted as important by two submitters who identified it as an urgent matter. Preferred sites for the library included the old New World supermarket, the Halswell pool, next to proposed school development and north of the Halswell Domain.

Fendalton

Two submitters were concerned about the amount of traffic and litter that proposed extended open hours would cause and argued that Fendalton residents deserved one quiet day per week. Of concern to one submitter was the competition a café would bring to local businesses. Three submitters including the Fendalton/Waimairi Community Board supported the idea of a café and extended opening hours.

Central library

The overall theme of submissions indicted the need for good planning in the execution of any new facility in the city. Three submitters identified the need for any central library development to be linked to the bus exchange with the need for close proximity car parking also mentioned. Two submitters saw the opportunity to partner with other Council and non-Council services as a positive. Three submitters were concerned with costs associated with building a new library and suggested how cost savings could be made. Hagley/Ferrymead Community Board was supportive of the need for a 'high quality facility' to accommodate growth. One submitter expressed the need for 20-40 year planning for growth.

Voluntary Libraries

Most of the submissions were concerning Redcliffs and Opawa libraries and some general comments about the role of these libraries in the community. Tenor of the comments about Redcliffs was the value the community placed in the services provided by the library, being of most value to the elderly and young families. The Opawa submissions also commented on the value of having a 'walkable' library service for elderly and strongly supported the volunteers who worked at the library. A petition signed by the users of the Opawa Library supporting the retention of the service was attached to one submission containing 93 signatures. Three Community Boards supported the ongoing funding of the voluntary libraries in their wards.

Bishopdale Library

Two of the submitters were concerned with the current state and future of the Bishopdale Mall and were keen to see the Council working on an inclusive plan for the mall that included the future of the library and other services. Four suggested using the old New World supermarket site opposite the current building including the Fendalton/Waimairi Community Board.

Redwood Library

Five submitters indicated disappointment if Redwood were to close citing the role the library plays in homework help, the elderly people local community accessibility. One submitter suggested the library stay open until after Belfast opened and another suggested Papanui would be a good alternative as it is easy to access by bus, suggesting that Redwood should close.

Shirley Library

Three submitters were positive about the proposal to work with the 'The Palms' owners as long as the Council's interests were strongly protected. A new building to meet the needs of the growing community was a theme in all submissions and the co-location of other Council services was also encouraged.

Sumner Library

The theme of both submissions was that the current library is not adequate for the size of the population in the area.

Lyttelton

Comments from three submitters including the Lyttelton/Mt Herbert Community Board, related to operational issues which will be addressed in the management of the library.

Akaroa

Two submitters suggested size and hours of opening improvements, and one suggested closure of Akaroa in order to keep Little River library open.

Diamond Harbour

Diamond Harbour School Board of Trustees indicated interest in a possible partnership with the Council and suggested any planning should happen before new school library was underway.

Linwood Library

Two submitters suggested any new library should mirror the successful aspects of the current one.

Mobile

Two Community Boards and a resident supported the ongoing service the mobile offers to the community.

South

Two submitters shared positive comments about the design and service at South Library. There were two comments critical of aspects of the design.

Spreydon

Two submissions were received, both regarding recent refurbishment issues and one commented on the poor location of the library, lack of parking and traffic issues.

Ferrymead

There were three comments regarding the future of Ferrymead as a service centre for the hill communities.

Key issues/attributes of provision and criteria

Citywide network

The themes that emerged regarding the overall plan for the library network were support for the vision and the importance of anticipating the growth in the city.

Community strengthening and providing community hubs

The majority of submissions supported the importance of the role of libraries in the community as meeting places for all members of the community.

Services and collections

A wide range of comments were received on various aspects of libraries from operational issues to compliments and a number of questions. These submissions will be addressed through normal management channels as well as being used in future planning and discussion.

Partnership opportunities

Although most of the submissions were supportive of partnership opportunities, cautionary notes included the need for the Council to ensure that the community's needs were at the forefront of any partnership especially with commercial operations. High schools, rest homes and other Council services were seen as ideal partners by some submitters.

Co-location

All submissions were supportive of the co-location of libraries with other community services including Service Centres, Citizens Advice Bureaus, Legal Aid and a variety of others.

Transport

Links to public transport was the common theme of all submissions as well as good car parking. Public transport themes were also mentioned in other submissions on individual libraries.

Conclusion

The level of interest in the suggested investigations into service options for the Little River Library drew the most responses. The main developments of Halswell, Aranui, Belfast and Central attracted submissions predominantly in favour of the proposed developments. The tenor of the comments ranged from strong support to some concerns about some aspects of the developments. Many of the submissions in these areas suggested locations for new facilities. Three voluntary libraries were represented in the submissions with the most being from the Opawa Library. All Community Board submissions were supportive of most aspects of the plan. Most single issue submissions were based on operational needs but also showing support for the libraries in most cases as well as voicing concerns or asking questions in others.
