1. APOLOGIES

Apologies were received and accepted from Commissioner Tom Lambie and Councillors, Lindsay Philps and Sue Wells.

2. CONFIRMATION OF PREVIOUS MINUTES

It was **resolved** that the Minutes of the previous meeting of 22 August 2011, as circulated, be taken as read and confirmed.

3. WELCOME

The Chairman welcomed Councillor Claudia Reid to the meeting and advised that the Christchurch City Council was reviewing its membership of Committees, following the resignation of Councillor Chrissie Williams and that for this meeting Councillor Reid had observer status.

4. UDS BI-MONTHLY IMPLEMENTATION REPORT

In the discussion that followed comment was made in respect of:

- The Independent Chair advised that the Chief Executives Group is to look at the role of the Independent Chairman.
- There is need to consider collectively regarding the recruitment of staff by the partner councils, as all are vying for extra staff to carry out similar roles. It was noted this was a matter for the Chief Executives.
- Each authority should check the suitability of the 2012 proposed meeting dates although the Independent Chair noted that Mondays were not generally suitable to have senior CERA representatives attend.

It was resolved that

- 1. The Bi-Monthly report of the Independent Chair and Acting IMG Chair be received
- 2. That the meeting schedule and arrangements be confirmed in principle.

1. PURPOSE OF REPORT

This report provides an update to the UDSIC on UDS implementation activities in addition to those which are the subject of separate reports.

2. IMPLEMENTATION

2.1 UDS Implementation Manager

Keith will commence as Implementation Manager in January 2012.

As per CEAG discussion at October meeting, Tim Harris, Planning Manager with Selwyn District Council has been undertaking various implementation management tasks with support from the IMG Chair (Jill Atkinson) and the Independent Chair.

2.2 Give Effect To Seminar: Regional Policy Statement (attachment 1)

A seminar is being organised for February 2012 for all UDS officers involved in implementing Chapters 12A and 22 of the Regional Policy Statement. An overview will be provided along with examples of 'what has worked' from each Council. The focus will be on applying a consistent interpretation of Chapters 12A and 22 across the UDS Councils and now that Change 1 is operative, what 'give effect' to means for each Council within its district plan processes. It is also about making Chapters 12A and 22 work in the context of earthquake recovery, by providing a focus for where urban development occurs in an enhanced and more efficient manner. See Attachment 1 in respect of seminar outline

2.3 Staff Process: Dealing with an Approach by a Developer or Land Owner which are Inconsistent with, or requires Interpretation of, Chapters 12A and 22 of the RPS

The following process has been developed by IMG for implementation by UDS partners:

1. Decision to initially meet is at the discretion of that Council. The Local Authorities shall advise their staff that these meetings need to be with the respective person from the Planning Managers sub group.

- 2. Where the proposal is considered to be inconsistent with urban limits, numbers of households, sequencing, needs interpretation, or is considered to have significant consequences a meeting shall be held with all members of the Planning Managers sub group, note this could include an invitation to CERA if they have also been approached or are likely to be so.
- 3. Proposals shall be brought forward by the respective member of the sub group, using the approved template, for assessment. There shall be agreement between the sub group members on the initial feedback to the developer or land owner, together with the form that feedback shall take. A copy of the feedback shall also be sent to CERA for their information.
- 4. The Planning Managers sub group shall maintain a table setting out their decision, the reasons for their decision, the date of their assessment and when and how the feedback was to be given to the developer or landowner. Where follow up meetings are required or held with the developer or landowner these are also to be recorded. Christchurch City Council is required to maintain and update the table recording the decision-making.
- 5. The Planning Managers sub group shall make staff recommendations to the UDSIMG for any potential fast tracking or changes of position with regard to Chapter 12A.
- 6. If required, relevant matters will be escalated and referred to CEAG as required for determination and/or recommendation to UDSIC if required. It is proposed that both UDSIC and CEAG would meet monthly next year

2.4 Risk profile

There are several key risks which affect the implementation of the UDS:

Subject: Proposed Amendments to Governance and Management

Arrangements for UDS Implementation

Meeting Date: 19 December 2011

1. Background

At the October meeting of the UDSIC there was considerable discussion regarding the most effective way in which matters relating to UDS implementation and earthquake recovery planning should be considered. The committee noted that there was a need to ensure that there was good alignment and engagement across and between the UDS partnership, CERA and Ngai Tahu and the need for CERA representation at the UDSIC and in respect of other UDS structures. This was particularly so given the legislative frameworks that are in place, and to avoid duplication of effort, multiple and conflicting arrangements between earthquake recovery and UDS implementation.

This report considers some minor amendments to the existing UDS implementation framework.

Subsequent to the meeting CERA has given consideration to the most effective way of achieving an integrated framework for the consideration of earthquake recovery planning matters and has concluded that grafting onto the existing UDS structures would be the most appropriate way to achieve this. It would involve using existing arrangements that would endure beyond the life of CERA, but would require some changes to the existing governance and management structures. This particular proposal is the subject of a separate and subsequent report.

The outcomes sought for governance arrangements for both recovery planning and UDS implementation is one that:

- reflects a collaborative and integrated approach to the development of Recovery Plans through the establishment of effective working relationships
- establishes clear roles (advisory and decision making)
- reflects both the greater Christchurch context including existing frameworks (such as the UDS) and the role of the Minister (CER Act)

- is able to be established in a timely manner
- enables a smooth transition in April 2016 when CERA is no longer in place
- supports the development and alignment of recovery plans

In respect of the UDS implementation arrangements, it is considered that the addition of both CERA and Ngai Tahu would enable the abovementioned outcomes to be achieved from a UDS perspective and enable effective integration and involvement from across the partner agencies.

2. Proposal

In summary, it is proposed that the UDS structures be tweaked for UDS purposes. It is proposed that the UDS structures remain in place for UDS matters (business as usual) but that CERA and Ngai Tahu be added to all levels of the UDS governance and implementation framework.

Proposed Alterations to Existing UDS Structures: Part of Business as Usual

The proposed amendments to existing UDS structures are not considered to be major and will provide for CERA and Te Rununga o Ngai Tahu representation at all levels of the existing UDS structures. The changes required to achieve this are:

- UDSIC: Te Rununga o Ngai Tahu already has representation on the UDSIC and has had such representation since the adoption of the UDS in May 2007 by the partners.
 The only change proposed is the addition of CERA with observer status, which is same status that NZTA has.
- CEAG: The addition of both Ngai Tahu and CERA Chief Executives to the CEAG. CEAG
 has considered and committed to having both Chief Executives added to the group.
- IMG: The addition of both a Ngai Tahu and a CERA representative is agreed by CEAG.


3. Concluding Comments

The proposed amendments will be of benefit to all agencies and provide for a greater level of integration and effectiveness across the partner agencies. It will provide for both streamlining and efficient use of resources.


4. Recommendation
