NOTES OF A SEMINAR MEETING OF THE COUNCIL

ACTION

1. RESOLVING "HOTSPOTS" IN CHRISTCHURCH

A hard copy of the PowerPoint presentation was tabled. (Copy on file). This captured the "hotspots" as identified in March 2005.

During the presentation the following points, questions and comments were noted:

Those "hotspots" identified within the already zoned Urban land included Aidanfield (SWAP), Halswell on the Park (SWAP) and Colorado (Mairehau/Cranford).

Those identified within Rural zoned land included the following:

- Horners Drain (Cranford/Mairehau): monitored currently. Land has been acquired. Discussions underway to ensure the Council is moving in tandem with Transit NZ.
- Snellings Drain: Provision has been made in 2007 capital works budget for raising the level of the weir which is part of the No 2 Drain system.
- Wigram (SWAP): No comment.
- Hendersons Basin: Why not part of presentation? Response: Part of South West Area Plan (SWAP), driven by surface water management issues, and seen as example of a sustainable solution for the Council.

Seminar Topic:

Design issues will be the topic of a future seminar and further report to the Council. Staff were requested to include costs and a variety of options in seminar presentation.

ACTION

• Are hotspots being identified early enough? Does the Council have an integrated approach? Response: It is recognised there is some zoning impact and associated constraints for the Council. Otherwise staff consider they have a good overview.

New Hotspots since March 2005:

- **Bridle Path Area Plan:** Landowners had been advised last year they would have an answer in six months where is this at? Response: the Council has identified with landowners the measures to resolve issues and associated investigations are underway, some of which may require the Council to take additional advice. It is recognised the Council is dealing with deferred zoning but has to move carefully given the expectations of landowners. Some time delays have been caused by unexpected complications.
- **Tumara Park:** ECan issued the initial decision, and the CCC is now the holder of the consent. The Council is working with ECan and Ngai Tahu toward reaching acceptable quality stormwater discharge into Travis Swamp. The responsibility lies with Ngai Tahu to rectify the problem.
 - ➤ How does this differ from Aidanfield? Response: The Council had obtained a consent in its own right from ECan.
 - ➤ If the two consents merged, could the Council become liable, as per Aidanfield? Response: Ngai Tahu was required to obtain its own consent. The CCC understands it will need to manage outcome. Any change of consent will impact on the CCC consent both consents need to merge as one.
 - ➤ How long before the problem discovered? Response: Councillors to be advised.
 - ➤ Stage 2 and 3 of the Tumara Park development now up for sale why, if solution not found yet for Stage 1? Fix problem first if Stage 1 not performing, Stages 2 and 3 should be 'on hold'. Response: The seminar was advised the Council has an opportunity to discuss the best solution with Ngai Tahu. The issue is the level of inundation in the Recreation Reserve ponding area, which is flooding more than originally anticipated. A higher infiltration gallery is planned by Ngai Tahu to resolve the problem. Need to put in context, as this is a planned inundation area, and within the next two weeks Ngai Tahu will be putting a solution to ECan. Staff were requested to keep the Council in the loop, recognising the need to avoid a further Aidanfield situation.
 - ➤ Legal question from elected members: Please check if subdivision consents for Stages 2 and 3 have all other consents alongside and if the Council is able to meet these.

Reports

Subdivision Building consents appear to immediately follow the granting of a subdivision consent. Could the Council hold off on building consents until problem sorted? Staff undertook to ask the question of the subdivisions team about timing and associated issues and report back.

Wigram

Who will hold consent for Wigram? Response: Will be joint discharge consent through ECan, which will come to the CCC. Designed to be part of integrated management plan (IMP). A more robust investigating process is now incorporated in to the conditions of consent to avoid a repeat of Aidanfield. The CCC is now making significant provision to cope with future development (paid for by developer) and retrospective (cost to the CCC).

Bond

It was proposed that a bond within a timeframe for long term partners be investigated further.

2. URBAN DESIGN PROTOCOL ACTION PLAN – AN ACTION PLAN FOR 2007/08

Hugh Nicholson (Urban Designer), spoke to a PowerPoint presentation (copy on file) which summarised the action plan to date, identifying projects and the status of each associated target.

Copies of the presentation to be circulated to elected members at the close of the seminar.

During the presentation the following points were noted:

Central City Bridge Lighting

- Councillors sought a target of lighting one bridge per annum with sponsorship.
- Fibre optics over Armagh Street bridge?
- Noted the Asset Management Plans for bridges are designed around maintenance.
- Underlighting of Worcester Street Bridge very successful out of reach of vandals. Design important.

ACTION • Staff were requested to investigate insurance to cover vandalism and will follow up on number of bridges being lit each year – will check with Greenspace and update where at and what is planned. • Strong concern from Councillors: advise staff not to drop money from projects to cover vandalism (ie move capital funding to maintenance). Staff understood current projects include Bridge of Remembrance, Band Rotunda and vandalised property. • Check David Bolam-Smith's ongoing involvement with the lighting projects. Report Hugh Nicholson/ Staff were requested to report on bridge lighting. Mike Theelen • **Urban form strategy** – has this been *replaced* in the LTCCP? No, set back a year – rewording agreed to substitute the word "reprioritise". **Hugh Nicholson** • "Run biennial awards programme to recognise good urban design in city" - CCC funding ceased in 2004 - Former Environment Awards bronze disc on kauri stand. Consensus that these should be awarded annually (eg well-designed subdivisions). Staff will revisit the Hugh Nicholson/ criteria and bring information back to councillors. Mike Theelen **Developing Strategy and Policy** • Include stormwater re-use as part of strategy? Request to include in the Hugh Nicholson/ Urban Design Protocol Action Plan. Staff will report back on criteria. Mike Theelen **What next?** Staff will review and report back to the Council in October. Hugh Nicholson/ Mike Theelen Discussion: During the subsequent discussion the following points were noted: - **Encourage developers** to talk with architect to urban design panel, so architect can "get a steer". By time gets to resource consent process, have a workable solution. Urban Design Panel - make part of consenting process? Former BPDC had staff present a proposal to such a panel – resulted in a co-operative approach – Akaroa experience cited. **Urban Design Panel:** The formation of an Urban Design Panel was a recommendation from the seminar and supported by the majority of Hugh Nicholson/ elected members. Mike Theelen/ Explore **relationships with** existing groups (Architects Association etc). Hugh Nicholson/ - **Recognise good design**: ie concepts to treat grey and wastewater on site. Need genuine incentive for developers. Greenfields survey being completed, but understood aspects have been implemented already. Effect on amenity values questioned – how can

this be included? Staff to seek information from project manager as to

how this is used.

- **Urban design plan change** – would be very keen to see Council go down that track. Staff will investigate and report back.

- **Brownfield sites** – The forthcoming Central City Revitalisation report will describe a programme which will look at identifying where the council could encourage better design eg similar to the Turners and Growers site.

- Low Impact Urban Design and Development Sustainability design –
 elected members requested staff to follow up on *all* of these and report
 back.
- New way of addressing developments Set goals. Stormwater re-use in new subdivisions is it worth doing and if so, how? Information sought from staff through reporting back.
- Retrofitting existing housing: how can the Council be involved with bringing existing housing stock up to scratch? Statistics quoted: 47% of houses classifies "cold" by WHO standards. For example, target Waltham/Addington/Edgeware areas. Staff to report back.
- SAM areas considered that urban planning design panels would be complementary.
- Urban villages/office space moving out of central city potential conflict? Need to identify what the Council wishes to achieve.
- Need mix around Hagley Park and for brown fields sites. Increase height restriction in inner city? Living 3 why not a policy of no higher than highest tree?
- Best practice of urban development Freyburg and Melbourne examples cited some good examples from around the world. Put on agenda for future discussion. Need urban villages and houses in the mix and some decisions made asap. Agree with the UD Panel concept.
- "Raising the bar" for good design must be a Council priority and for the long term. Need to recognise the importance of design: "the way it looks, as well as the way it works".
- Way forward elected members commented they will need to have more time when outcomes presented to Councillors for further consideration.
 Apart from UDP concept, all too vague at present. Staff agreed there is a need to formulate ideas into more concrete proposals. However, the seminar was intended to provide an overarching summary of the issues.
- 2000 St Albans plan cited what progress?.
