MOVING CYCLING FORWARD	
Richard Stokes, Marketing Manager, Terry Howes, Asset and Network Planning Manager, and Kate Ward, Marketing Services Manager, presented a PowerPoint presentation covering:	
 Purpose of seminar. Cycling strategy - a quick recap. What does it mean? Marketing Review - overview. Where to from here? Key decisions: The development of a green light/red light process for future road infrastructure decision making to establish the elected members' position. 	Jane Parfitt/ Terry Howes/ Richard Stokes
Questions and comments were made in respect of:	
 Statistical information presented was six or seven years old, its relevance was questioned. Was there any research on the likely increase in scooter use. Whether or not the Orbiter bus service now operating had been factored in. Was the Council working in with the numerous cycle stores? Why was the Council spending money on marketing, when it was already known that there was a large percentage increase in cycling - why not just get on with it? Whether cycling was safer than being in a car was questioned.

	Pollution from buses etc was one reason recreational cyclists were not also commuter cyclists.	
	How did Christchurch compare in population etc to that of other cities around the world where cycling was popular.	
\triangleright	The use of safety helmets needed to be encouraged.	
	Was Christchurch doing in fact as good as had been thought with cycling? There was a risk preaching to the converted.	
	Cycleways needed to be properly maintained, as they are currently littered with broken glass.	
\triangleright	Cycleways must be safe for children to use.	
\triangleright	Was there good support for the Cycle Safe Campaign.	
Key	Decisions/Concluding Remarks	
\triangleright	Details of what the programme is was sought.	
	The process to be followed, as to where the project is referred to for approval.	
	The programme on project by project basis needed to be signed off by the Council as the first step before it is referred to the Community Board etc (at present no projects were being brought forward so that the installation of a cycleway on Opawa Road does not happen again).	
	The process at present was not delivering a good outcome, and political sensitivity had to be kept in mind.	
	Marketing should be focused on victories, rather than the belief that we are not doing anything.	
\triangleright	Options such as attractive off-road cycleways needed to be put in front of the Council, which currently was not happening.
