Background

 To assist the CCC in adopting a draft LTCCP, a citywide survey was carried out to better understand residential ratepayers'* preferences towards Council spending

*paying rates for at least one year

Objectives




1. Major Infrastructure Projects


- Question:
- From a list of some of the major infrastructure projects that have been proposed for the city, how important do you believe each project is for the future of Christchurch? (is that very or quite important/unimportant?)




Question:

- Thinking about these proposed major infrastructure projects, please rank the projects from 1 to 8 in order of their importance: I.e.
 - 1 = the project you think is most important
 - 2 = the project you think is the second most important
 - 3 = the project you think is the <u>third</u> most important And so on until you get to 8 = the project you think is <u>least</u> important






- Question:
- Funding these major infrastructure projects would have an impact on the rates paid by Christchurch ratepayers.
- At present the rates paid by an average city residence worth just under \$260,000 is around \$1080 a year which is about \$270 PER QUARTER
- For each of these projects the Council has calculated approximately how much it would add to the rates bill of an average household, on both a quarterly and annual basis.
- Please indicate how willing you would be for rates to increase by this average amount, if the project was to go ahead. Would you be quite willing to accept an increase, would you accept an increase reluctantly, or would you be not willing to accept an increase at all?



Question:

- To fund these major infrastructure projects would require significant increases in rates.
- These increases could be introduced immediately with a single, larger rates increase (of, say, 10 to 15 per cent) or smaller increases spread out over 10 years (of, say, 1 to 2 per cent per year). Any increase would be on top of normal increases to meet rising operating costs.
- If some or all of these projects were to proceed would you prefer to see a larger, once-only rates increase or smaller increases spread over a longer period?







- not provide this service at all








- Following is a list of some services that are currently funded solely by rates.





4. Rating Levels Question: In general, what sort of value for money do you believe you get for the level of rates you pay in Christchurch?



Question: In general, how happy would you be to see the level of rates you pay in Christchurch increase to be closer to the average of other cities, in order to fund future developments and maintain the quality of services?



Summary

- 75% of respondents considered they were getting 'good' or 'very good' value for money from their rates
- Roading, cycleways, and green links seen as most important infrastructure projects
- Development of the City Mall least important
- More willing to accept rate increases for cycleways and roads
- Rate increases incremental rather than big bang

- 6. Want better service levels for waste minimisation, cycleways, economic development, and streets
- Introduce user-charges for art gallery, some roads, and domestic water supply
- No consensus over moving to more reliance on user charges
- No consensus over increasing rates to other cities' average
