1. Hagley Oval

The proposal to allow the area to be used exclusively by the Canterbury Cricket Association is contrary to the Hagley Park management Plan 2007. This is public land and the public should not have to pay to enter.

2. Edgeware Pool

I am opposed to the proposed schemes for the use of the site. It should be used for a neighbourhood swimming pool as it used to be. In many places in the LTCCP document eg Pg 175, reference is made to the need to foster strong local communities, but when the strong St Albans community tried to retain an important sporting and recreational facility in its area it was rejected.

3. Waterways

The LTCCP refers to the need to encourage public participation in caring for our waterways. This will be difficult if the Council allows raw sewerage and other pollutants to flow into the major waterways on a number of days in the year. This may pose a serious health hazard.

4. Planning

I am concerned that nothing appears to have been done to alleviate the planning disaster which has adversely affected Ms Sarah Brown in Ely Street. After several years has the Council done anything to prevent this happening again and will Council compensate Sarah Brown?

5. Loss of Sunlight and Outlook

The LTCCP on Pg 189 refers to promoting the wellbeing of the community in social, cultural, economic and environmental terms. Sunlight and outlook are vital environmental factors of importance to householders. The City Plan allows buildings to be erected adversely affecting the sunlight and outlook for existing houses. This is unfair and could be alleviated by adopting the system proposed by the late Brian Bluck.
