1. TRANSPORT - When planning for roads, or realigning them I suggest looking to the future when population density moves out of the suburbs as we know them. Light rail could well be the answer for commuters from Pegasus/Rangiora/Kaipōi and Ingham/Templeton/Danfield.
2. POPULATION - No new development of more than 10-20 houses to be built identically. Sections to be of different sizes and shapes with houses constructed of various materials. Colours to vary but definitely harmonise. No more, please Aidenfield which is a monstrosity and does nothing for the environment - such a pity on such an attractive route to Akaroa.

3. COMMUNITY FACILITIES - Wherever a community centre is built a library and a community hall and meeting rooms should be included. A general information area with a police and community board member an advantage. A personal comment. No flooding on land ever, council permit granted which caused my land to flood. Years of negotiation it was eventually righted and only a couple of years later drainage was again altered and more flooding! At no stage was I consulted. This is not good enough.

Drinking water. Suddenly it tasted different and not nearly as nice, bubbles stayed overnight in the glass which has to be scoured regularly because of "build up". Overseas visitors staying in nearby accommodation have also complained about the

water. I complained to the Health Department who said that the source had been changed to Bunnside Park and the quality was not as good. An aside I have no wish to be hospitalised but the water there is like it used to be - pure and a delight. Is it possible to give us "aqua pura"?

WASTE MINIMISATION. Previously all paper and cardboard were kept separately. Now labour intensive they have to be separated by staff and kitchen rubbish that includes food scraps is mixed with newspaper wrappings, which I sort. Fendalton is referred to as the "Leafy Suburb" of the "Garden City". Why is the green bin so small? I compost what I can but some things are just not suitable. My garden is designed to give pleasure to others, health to us and also the environment with mature trees. The green bin is much too small and the yellow too big.

FINANCE - I have learnt from necessity not to be wasteful, consequently it upsets me to see so much waste of my rate money. Our road was upgraded and the contractor had not been supplied with up-to-date information and I had to produce official documents to prove what they were doing was incorrect. Meal breaks were frequent and extensive.
